MR. BORGMAN: This is the videotaped sworn 1 statement of Tony Thompson, held in the offices of Forensic Video Deposition Services, 2823 North 48th 3 Street, Phoenix, Arizona, on Saturday, March 5, 2005, 4 at the time indicated on the video screen. 5 certified legal video specialist and notary public is 6 Richard Borgman in association with Forensic Video 7 Deposition Services. 8 Will the attorney present please 9 introduce himself. 1.0 My name is Flint, F-l-i-n-t, MR. TAYLOR: 11 Taylor, and I'm here on behalf of Aaron Patterson and 1.2 Leroy Orange in the cases in federal court. Also 13 present is my investigator, Mort Smith. 14 (WHEREUPON, the Witness was 15 sworn.) 16 TONY THOMPSON, 17 called as a witness herein, having been first 18 duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows: 19 EXAMINATION 2.0 BY MR. TAYLOR: 21 Mr. Thompson, could you tell us your 22 present age. 23 I'm 48. Α 24

| 1  | Q Okay. And are you presently working?                |

| 2  | A I am.   |
| 3  | Q And how long have you been working at               |
| 4  | the job that you that you're presently working at?    |
| 5  | A Uh, a year in April.                                |
| 6  | Q Okay. And calling your attention now                |
| 7  | back to 1979, did you live in Chicago at that time?   |
| 8  | A I did.  |
| 9  | Q And calling your attention                          |
| 10 | specifically to the 28th of September                 |
| 11 | A Um-hum.   |
| 12 | Q 1989, sometime in the late morning                  |
| 13 | or early afternoon of that date, did you have an      |
| 14 | occasion to be brought into custody by Chicago police |
| 15 | officers?   |
| 16 | A I did.  |
| 17 | Q And could you tell us briefly how that              |
| 18 | happened.   |
| 19 | A I was in the um, involved in an                     |
| 20 | armed robbery. Naturally it went south. Police        |
| 21 | arrived on the scene. Um, a shootout, uh, emerged.    |
| 22 | I managed to get a couple of blocks away, then I was  |
| 23 | apprehended and detained from that point.             |
| 24 | Q Okay. Now, could you give me a                      |

general address where you were apprehended?

A Vaguely. Winchester, I do believe.

was, um, somewhere on Winchester, if I'm not

mistaken.

Q Okay. Winchester and --

A It's vague.

Q -- how -- and what cross street?

A I'm not sure.

Q Okay. Was it on the south side or west side?

A It was -- it was the south side.

It -- Dearborn Wholesale. I don't totally recall the exact street that it was on, but it was a couple of blocks, um, if I'm not mistaken, east of it.

Q Okay. Now, when you were apprehended, did you receive any physical injury?

A In -- in -- yes. Um, when they, um, subdued me and cuffed me, I got punched around, kicked around and, um, picked up and throwed into the paddy wagon.

Q Okay. But at that time had you received serious injuries to your face or other parts of your body?

A Not -- no, not as I recall. No. It

| 22 | A They put me in a room. Um, I sit                    |
| 23 | there for, um, several hours. Later that evening      |
| 24 | they came up and took me out and put me in a squad    |

| 17 | seen the people you now call Gorman and Burge before? |
| 18 | A No.   |
| 19 | Q Okay. Did they identify themselves to               |
| 20 | you subsequently or at the time they took you to 90th |
| 21 | and Cottage?  |
| 22 | A Not per se, no. Not as I recall, no.                |
| 23 | I   |
| 24 | Q How did you learn their names?                      |

It became, uh, through my, uh, court Α 1 appearances and transcripts and things of that 2 nature, um, I became familiar with who they are. 3 Okay. 0 4 Names, per se. 5 Now, when you say they took you over 0 6 to Area 2 sometime in the evening of the 28th of September -- is that right? 8 Correct. 9 All right. Describe to me what 0 10 happened when they took you to Area 2. 11 Well, they took me upstairs, um, in a 12 room, interrogating room. There was, um, a chair up 13 against the wall with two mountings, uh, hook 14 mountings, on the wall, on each mounting spreaded 1.5 apart like this (indicating), the distance, and they 16 had handcuffs to them. 17 They handcuffed me to the chair -- uh, 18 to the mountings on the wall as I was sitting in the 19 chair, and they began to ask me questions. 20 Now, "they" is who? 21 0 Burge, per se. Α 22 All right. 23 0 Burge asked me questions and --Α 24

| 19 | MR. BORGMAN: Hold it up a little longer.              |
| 20 | (WHEREUPON, Mr. Taylor complied.)                     |
| 21 | MR. TAYLOR: All right. Picture 2. I'm going           |
| 22 | to show you all                                       |
| 23 | (WHEREUPON, Photograph was marked                     |
| 24 | as 2 and displayed for camera.)                       |

MR. BORGMAN: Hold it farther away. 1 (WHEREUPON, Mr. Taylor complied.) 2 MR. TAYLOR: I'm not going to -- I'm going to 3 put them all together, so I'm not showing them to the 4 witness at this point. I'm going to give him all 5 five at the same time. 6 MR. BORGMAN: Okay. MR. TAYLOR: All right? This is picture 3. 8 (WHEREUPON, Photograph was marked 9 as 3 and displayed for camera.) 10 This is picture 4. 11 (WHEREUPON, Photograph was marked 12 as 4 and displayed for camera.) 13 And picture 5 is this one. 14 (WHEREUPON, Photograph was marked 15 as 5 and displayed for camera.) 16 BY MR. TAYLOR: 17 All right. Now, I'm going to show you 18 these. Let me see if I can put these in -- well, 19 they have numbers on the back, so it doesn't really 20 matter. 21 I'm going to just put them all down 22 here, and I'm going to ask you, if you can, these 23 many years later, pick out the person who you have 24

said was Burge who was questioning you. 1 This one (indicating). Α 2 MR. TAYLOR: And the record should show that 3 he has picked out the picture number 2, which is, in 4 fact, Jon Burge. 5 BY MR. TAYLOR: 6 Okay. Burge started questioning you 7 0 in the evening hours at Area 2. What happened --8 9 what was he questioning you about? My accomplices, because initially at 10 Α that time I was the only one that they apprehended. 11 All right. And they apprehended you 12 for a robbery, did you say, an armed robbery? 13 That is correct. 14 Α All right. And was that an armed 15 robbery where there had been shooting at police 16 officers? 17 Yes. 18 Α All right. And was -- were you 19 0 apprehended in the vicinity of where this robbery 20 took place? 21 Yes. 22 Α All right. Now, so they were 0 23 questioning you about this robbery. And what 24

happened after they started questioning you?

A I was nonresponsive and, um, he became belligerent, irritated, and proceeded initially to hit me over the head with, um, a phone book, then it exceeded to a long flashlight and the punching with -- with his fists.

All right. Now, who -- are there still basically three, these same three, detectives or -- or three plain-clothes officers in the room while all this -- while this beating that you've described is going on?

A Yes.

And all of the three of them, were they all participating in the beating or was one or two of them more involved? Could you tell me more detail about who was doing what.

One in it. Uh, the other one, Gorman, or whatever his name, he would just, you know, like, in reinforcement, hit me upside the head or something, or grab me by my neck and yank my face up and say stuff and -- like, you're going -- you'll divulge what we need to know, what we want to know before this is over, and whatever acronyms (sic) that he

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would make, racial acronyms he would make. And then 1 Burge would resume his -- his method of persuasion, 2 more or less. 3 Well, let me ask you. You used the 4 term "racial acronyms." Give me --5 Α Well, you know --6 7 What were they saying? He would, you know, um, use the 8 "nigger" word and "you black son of a bitch, God had 9 diarrhea when he created you motherfuckers, " things 10 of that nature, you know, just racial stuff like 11 that, you know. 12 Now, were they all saying that or was 0 13 there --14 Burge. Burge was the focus point, uh, 15 16 for all of it. All right. Now, you said you were 17 0 being hit over the head with a phone book? 18 Phone book. 19 Α All right. And a flashlight? 20 Q Yeah. One of the long flashlights. Α 21 Um-hum. 22 Q Yeah. 2.3 Α And was -- was there any reference 2.4 0

made to Gorman in the context of what he was or what 1 kind of reputation he had? 2 Um, one of the two of them indicated Α 3 that they was affiliated with the Fred Hampton and 4 Mark Clark raid. And, uh, then the ensued gun battle 5 that took place, that they were, uh, participants in 6 it. And my understanding was that Burge 8 was a party to that, and Gorman, um, was also. 9 had been with one another, a partnership, for an 10 extensive period of time and how that they do have 11 ways of persuading people to talk to them. 12 So they were saying that they were 13 0 involved in the Fred Hampton Black Panther raid? 14 Yes. Α 15 Did they specifically say that they 16 had been involved in killing Fred Hampton? 17 Yes. 18 Α And they were using that as a 19 0 technique, you thought, to -- to further intimidate 20 you? 2.1 Exactly. 22 Α Now, did -- through the All right. 23 0 beating with a flashlight and the phone book and, I 24

take it, with fists as well --1 Yes. А 2 -- did you receive injuries to your 3 face or body? 4 He hit me, uh, with the flashlight. 5 He got -- he got -- he became belligerent and 6 irritated, "He," meaning? 8 9 Α Uh, Burge. Um-hum. Q 10 And he grabbed the flashlight and he 11 A swung at me here (indicating), and I got eight, ten 12 stitches here. It busts instantaneously. 13 Burge, uh -- the other guy, Gorman, 14 pulls him off and, uh, proceeded to give the innuendo 15 of calming him. And he breaks loose from him, rush 16 backs (sic) to me and knocked me out of the chair, 17 kicked me, stomped me a couple of times because I'm 18 on the floor. Though I am stretched out, part of my 19 body's on the floor, but I'm in this angle 20 21 (indicating). Meaning you're handcuffed? 22 I'm still handcuffed. Yeah. Не 23

handcuffed me to -- I was handcuffed to the two -- to

the two, uh, hooks that was on the walls.

Q Um-hum.

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A After that, uh, he picked me back up then slammed me back down in the chair. And one of them, which I don't recall exactly who, said, the son of a bitch is bleeding all over us, bleeding all over me, and made a comment about his pants being expensive or something to that effect.

As I could recall, some time elapsed.

He left out and come back. And the other officer,

uh, detective, that was standing there in the

background pretty much, came in, unhooked me, took me

downstairs.

When I got ba -- when I got downstairs, they put me in a car. Burge and Gorman was in the front and this guy was in the back with me. They took me to the -- to a hospital and the doctor sewed me up. He sewed me up from right here (indicating), and then my eyelid. Um --

- Q Indicating, for the record, your right eye?
  - A Yes. My right eye and my eyelid.

pretty much incoherent and -- and maintaining focus 1 and adheredness (sic), you know. 2 Um-hum. 0 3 I would pass out periodically and I 4 would wake up, or he would bring me back around, uh, 5 through a onslew (sic) of hit -- of hitting, per se, 6 and, um, the questioning would start all over again. Now, did they bring you to the same 8 room or a different room or do you know? 9 It was the same -- it was -- as I Α 10 recall, it was the same room. 11 Are you handcuffed this time or not? 12 0 Behind my back. 1.3 Α Not to the rings this time? 14 No, not to the rings. I'm -- I'm Α 15 being handcuffed behind my back at this point --16 Now, this --0 1.7 -- because it was straight from when 18 they handcuffed me, taking me from the -- to the car 19 and back to the car. Even when the doctor was doing 20 the stitching, I was, uh, handcuffed in the back. 21 Do you remember what hospital this 22 23 was? Little Mary or Little Company of Mary 24 Α

or somebody Mary. Something to that effect.

- Q Little Company of --
- A I was --

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- Q -- St. Mary Hospital?
- 5 A Yeah. I was in and out quickly.
  - Q Um-hum. They brought you in and out.

    Okay. The second time you're back in the room at

    Area 2 and Burge comes back in and you're feeling,

    like, in and out of consciousness --
    - A Um-hum.
  - Q -- what happened in terms of the questioning at that point?
  - A He goes on to make accu -- accusations about what he's going to do, such as he indicated what he would do with my family. At that point in time, my --
    - Q What did he say?
  - A At that point in time, my fiancee was pregnant with my son, and he used the fact that he's going to involve her in this, uh, because the car that I was driving belonged to her, was in her name, et cetera. And he's going to go over there and pick that bitch up and, you know, before I see her again, she going to look like me, and all that kind of

stuff.

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He left out -- no. Another guy comes and knocked on the door and whispers something to him, and then he said openly to Gorman, we better let this motherfucker make this phone call. We don't want him to -- we don't want it to slip up for violation of -- through technicalities. That was the term, through technicalities.

Shortly thereafter I went and made the phone call, called home and got, uh, to talk to my fiancee. Then I got a number to my brother and I called him to impress him on my situation and for him to start notifying people to obtain whatever money that would be needed and to facilitate me a lawyer.

- Q Now, your brother is -- what is his name?
  - A Thompson, Timothy.
- Q All right. And did he ultimately get arrested for this case as well?
  - A Then later he did.
- Q Okay. So what happened during this phone call in terms of --
- A Afterwards, Burge come out the room -- come into the room, snatched the phone from me and

slammed it down and called me a ignorant son of a bitch. He say, we got you, we got him.

At that point I was taken back into the room in which that -- that was adjacent to the room that, uh, the phone was in, and I sit there and I could see them scurrying about acquiring equipment, such as vests and rifles and things of that nature. He's giving a slew of orders to the guys that was accompanying him.

Some time passed, uh, and afterwards, um, everybody that was a party to what took place, the robbery, per se, uh, they was in custody.

Q Okay. Now, during this second time you were at Area 2 after coming back from the hospital, was there any physical brutality or any kind of coercive techniques used on you at that particular point by Burge or any others?

It was a thing that he called the "Nigger Box." He told one of the -- one of the detectives, I don't know if it was Gorman or the other one, he said, go get the "Nigger Box."

They brought in a box and began to -it had wires extended from it, and he would just poke
it at me, you know, into my chest and down into my

genitals and would laugh about it.

You know, it would make you do a jerking thing. And, you know, I remember, uh, losing my fluids, and a slew of it. He slapped me around some more and they were laughing about it, and this, that and the other.

At this point I passed out, and what brought me back was -- the next thing I remember, it was -- he threw a glass of water or a cup of water.

Water came over my face. And when I -- he had water, a cup in his hand. He stuck me a couple more times with the box and he said, this is just for fucking up my whole night, and things of that nature.

At that point they had all the information that I think that they needed, so I think that was just the, um -- the end segment of it as memorabilia, if you will.

- Q Now, you say he brought a box? Do you remember what color it was?
  - A It was dark in color.
  - Q Okay.
  - A So I'm assuming black.
- Q Okay. And you say wires came out of

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It was wires extended from it. Yes. Α 1 And when he stuck -- and he stuck 2 Q these wires into your chest and your genital area, 3 did you say? 4 Yes. Α 5 All right. What happened? Did you Q 6 feel any sensation when he stuck these wires in you? I felt a surge of voltage, um, infused 8 in me, you know, almost a burning, you know, inside. 9 Okay. Did you have a shirt on at this Q 10 time or how did --11 Um, a partial. It was a T-shirt that 12 13 was ripped. Um-hum. Okay. And when they put the 14 0 shock -- did you feel the shock on your genitals when 15 he -- when they did that? 16 Yes. Α 17 All right. And were your genitals 0 18 exposed at that time or did they do it through your 19 clothes? 20 He just -- yeah. He do it -- he did 21 Α it through my clothes. He didn't expose me. 22 Okay. Now, on how many occasions did 23 0 you get shocked by this -- these wires that came out 24

of this black box -- or, excuse me, this dark-colored box?

A In the -- it was just the one session, so it was done repeatedly. It was not like it was a continue -- or a break in between and then continued thereafter. So it was a -- it was a continuation of it, you know, that lasts, I would estimate, ten, 15 minutes, you know.

And he would -- like I say, they would step back and laugh about it and say something, make some comments, and, you know, watch this, watch this, watch this motherfucker, and he would do it again and, you know, I would yell out and quiver at the same time and things of that nature. So it was --

O So this --

A It was not like he took a break here and came back a hour or so later and re -- redid it.

- Q So it was a session of about ten or 15 --
  - A It was --
- Q -- minutes.

- 23 A Yes. It was, uh, one session. Yeah.
- Q And during that ten or 15-minute

session, he repeatedly hit you with the electricity 1 from this -- these wires; is that right? 2 Α Correct. 3 Okay. And you were -- were you in a 4 chair at this time or were you on the floor or do you 5 remember how you were situated? 6 Initially I was in the chair. And as Α 7 this took place, yeah, I mean, you know, I bolted out 8 of the chair. 9 Um-hum. 0 10 You know, I was skirm -- skirmaging 11 (sic) across the room, you know, but I was still 12 cuffed from behind. 13 And you screamed out in pain or shock 0 14 when you -- when he hit you with this electric shock? 15 In pain or shock? Α 16 No. 17 0 What's -- what's -- I don't get that Α 18 19 one. All right. Did you --20 Q No. It was just pain. Α 21 It was pain. I'm sorry. 22 Q Wasn't no -- the shock came. 23 А Yes. Q 24

| 16 | Q Did they   |
| 17 | A All in that sensation of time. Yeah.               |
| 18 | I mean, when he initially started the shocking       |
| 19 | aspects of it, that was a catalyst to me blacking    |
| 20 | out, I do believe, apart from the head injury, you   |
| 21 | know, and the swelling and all of which. But that    |
| 22 | was one of the main focus, one of the main catalysts |
| 23 | of me blacking out.                                  |
| 24 | And when I re regained                               |

consciousness -- for however long I was out, I can't 1 say. But when I regained consciousness, um, yeah, 2 there was a dripping, you know, down my face and, um, 3 then he started it, the same process, all over again. 4 Meaning the shocking. 5 The shocking. Yeah. Α 6 Now, did you say that Gorman was in 0 the room when -- when this happened? 8 9 Yes. All right. "This," meaning the 0 10 shocking. 11 Yes. Α 12 Okay. Was there any detectives, 13 0 plain-clothes officers, in the room other than Gorman 14 and Burge when Burge was shocking you? 15 Yes, there was another one. I -- he Α 16 just, I don't know, stood in the background, for the 17 most part, like I said, by the door for whatever 18 reason. I didn't have any -- as I can recall, any, 19 uh, physical encounters with him that I can recall. 20 Now, the reason that you can identify 21 0 Burge and Gorman is because they appeared in your 22 case at some point and in your brother's case and --23 Well, in actuality, due to that 24 Α

incident, true enough. But there later, um, I went 1 to jail, um, Cook County jail, and I bonded out and recuperated at home. 3 As three or four days passed, they 4 came to my house again with, um, other charges --5 Uh-huh. 0 6 -- that I wasn't -- that I was not a Α party to. But still and yet, they brought up other 8 charges from different areas of Chicago, and I was 9 reinstituted, relocked up. And at that point I 10 stayed -- I stayed, uh, in jail. 11 So "they," meaning -- who was the 12 "they" that came back to your house? 1.3 Burge and Gorman and, um, another Α 14 squad, this time, of officers. 15 And do you recognize Burge and Gorman 16 as being the ones who had tortured and -- and beaten 17 18 you --Prior to. Yes. Д 19 -- some days before? 0 20 Yes. Α 21 Okay. Now, did you at some point give 22 a statement concerning your involvement in this armed 23 robbery that you had been arrested for?

Due to, uh, the course of time that Α 1 this took place, a statement had been written up, I 2 found out later. And, yes, I did sign it. 3 Okay. Now, do you know -- and that 4 admitted involvement in the armed robbery and the 5 shooting at the police that you had been arrested 6 for; is that right? 7 Was I --Α 8 Was that what the statement -- did the 9 0 statement make --10 Yes. Α 11 It admitted to that? 0 12 It was an admission to that. Yes. Α 13 Okay. And was there a state's 14 attorney that was involved in either taking that 15 statement or -- or witnessing it when you signed it? 16 Α Yes. 17 Okay. And did you sign that statement 18 before or after they applied the electric shock to 19 you? Do you remember? 20 After. Α 21 Okay. And did the electric -- excuse 0 22 So you've told us about a -- the beating with 2.3 me. the phone book and with the flashlight and fists, and 24

you've told us about the session with electric shock, which came later, right, after you came back from the hospital from the beating, right?

A Right.

Q Was there any other physical abuse or -- or coercion that was used on you other than these two very serious incidents that you've told us about?

A Not that I recall.

Q All right. Was there any -- other than in the session that the -- that you were electric shocked repeatedly, did they also beat you at that time or was it simply electric shocking at that particular portion of the --

A It was in conjunction with. It was a combination of the two. I mean, electric shock would take place for a while and then the slapping and the hitting.

And, like I said, I fell out of the chair and then I was kicked and stomped and picked back up and the process repeated itself.

Now, in this -- but when you were being electric shocked, you were handcuffed behind your back; is that right?

A Yes.

Other than the three detectives and -or plain-clothes officers, I should say, because
Burge was actually a sergeant at that point -- that
you've described, Gorman, Burge and the third
person --

A Um-hum.

Q -- were there any other plain-clothes officers in the room at Area 2 during the time that you were beaten and electric shocked?

A Not as I recall.

Q Okay.

A I'm not saying that it could not have been, but you must take in consideration also that, uh, the severity of the beating did not provide me with the option of surveying the room.

O Um-hum.

A You know, I'm primarily focusing on -on the pain and trying to contain that as well as
myself. And, you know, there's a whole slew of other
things going through your head -- going through my
head.

And at that point my eyes was primarily closed shut to a slit so I can -- you know,

And the time progressed, meaning 5 because of the beatings and --6 The ordeal --Α 7 -- the torture you had at --0 -- that took place once I got --9 Α -- Area 2. 10 0 -- to Area 2. Yeah. Α 11 So anyone who says that you received 0 12 these -- these injuries and became "Tony Puff Face" 13 directly after being arrested and apprehended at the 14 scene, that's not accurate or true; is that right? 15 No. Definitely not. No. 16 All right. Now, after the beating and 17 the electric shocking that -- that took place at Area 18 2 in the evening and night hours of September 28th 19 and September 29th, did they have an occasion to take 20 you to a different police station to be locked up? 21 I went -- after -- after -- everybody 22 was pretty much apprehended. We was all in a, uh, 23

holding cell downstairs at Area 2. At that point,

um, I was taken out apart from everyone else, out the 1 back door to, uh, a waiting vehicle that transported 2 me to Cook County jail. 3 Okay. So they took you to Cook County 4 jail? 5 Um-hum. Α 6 They didn't take you to a lockup at 7 85th and Green, like --8 I --9 -- the Gresham District? 10 I was there initially. That's After? Α 11 where Burge and them initially picked me up from --12 I see. 13 -- from 85th and Green. But, no, I 14 didn't return to 85th and Green after that. After I 15 left Burge and them, my next destination was Cook 16 County jail. 17 All right. And were there pictures 18 taken of you at Cook County jail? 19 Ironically, no one seems to know. 20 Α yes, but, I mean, one cannot be, uh, admitted into a 21 facility like Cook County jail without there being a 22 mug shot taken and fingerprints and a DOC number, uh, 23

being issued to you.

Q But nobody's ever been able to obtain that picture of you?

A No. According to them, they -- they got misconstrued somewhere or lost somewhere or something to that effect. No one actually knows.

But the, uh -- a part that took place that is baffling is that this was public knowledge, this whole ordeal that took place, from the shooting all the way to, you know, when they made the arrests on, um, the other individuals. So the media was there.

And the media or the news depicted or showed everybody but me. So -- and they're coming in after it was announced, yeah, well, we got the guys and blah-blah-blah, they -- the media was there as they was bringing them into the police station.

And parting and leaving, the media was there and they showed everybody going -- these guys are going, however they termed it, to Cook County jail, and, yes, they have been apprehended and blah-blah-blah-blah. Everybody but me.

It came out later the reasoning why that was, why I was so privy to being escorted and left alone out of the side door, the back door,

was -- I was in lieu of being relegated as the 1 ringleader; so, therefore, I was offered a 20-year 2 sentence right here and now. And if I don't take the 3 20-year sentence, I'll go to trial and he was going 4 to ask for 60 to life. 5 And being that they had me dead to 6 right, I mean, I would have been -- it would have been slam dunk. 8 9 0 Um-hum. And did you get the sense that the kind of abuse that you were getting was because you had not only been involved in the robbery but were supposedly the guy who shot at some cops?

A Not only that. And being, uh, the African-American descent, as the term is now.

O Um-hum.

A And, uh, just the fact of -- of just blatant disrespect of authority. Yeah. So he found that to be just totally obnoxious.

Now, you told us about the racial -there were just flat-out racist things that Burge
said when they -- during the first beating, and you
told us about him referring to the black box as the
"Nigger Box."

During the second session, that being the one where you were electric shocked and slapped around and knocked out of the chair, was there any -- did Burge or Gorman or any other -- the third guy in the room make any other racial comments other than what you've already mentioned?

A Nothing that I could repeat at this -- at this time. I mean, I would think so, but nothing that -- that comes, you know, more to mind other than

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the comments that I already stated.

Q Were there racial comments going on during the electric shocking session --

A Yeah.

Q -- is what I'm asking.

A Definitely. I mean, it didn't -- that primarily never stopped, you know, as, like I say, going and coming and conscious and unconscious.

Yeah. You know, it was primarily there.

Now, you didn't get to -- to testify in court because you took what -- what appeared to be the best deal you could get in the case, right?

A Yeah.

Q And -- and did you have an occasion to tell anybody about the fact that you'd been electric shocked?

And -- and I imagine it was pretty obvious you had been seriously beaten, but did you tell your lawyer or any family members or any -- anyone that you had been electric shocked by Burge, you know, after it happened to you?

A I told -- yeah. Um, I went over it with my lawyer and I told him about the treatment that took place. And, um, when I did get out, you

know, I talked to my fiancee at the time about some
of the stuff that took place. Embarrassed as -- so I
don't think I went into any graphic detail, you know.

But, yeah, I, uh, can recall, yeah, I told some
people about it.

Q Okay. So you actually got out of -you were able to bond out on this case --

A I had a --

me, I was -- it was during a court session. I was appearing to court for arraignment, uh, or a pretrial, on all of which. And as I was leaving, they was on the outside of -- of the court room waiting.

Q "They," meaning?

A Burge and Gorman and a couple of

uniforms, uh, were there. And they took me and gave me some additional charges.

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And at that point I didn't bond out again because I had a primary restriction of no bond or basically what we would call a ransom, you know, over several hundred thousand dollars, you know, and they wasn't able to get me out.

Q Now, what happened to the other cases that they arrested you on? Did those go to trial or were those thrown out or --

A It was -- everything was ran concurrent. I made a plea of guilty to it all, uh, rather than -- I stayed in -- in Cook County jail for all of this over a period of two years.

So each case started to, you know, dissipate, and the others, I kind of -- yeah, okay, put them in there, because everything was running concurrent anyway. The time would not supersede the time that they had already agreed upon. So that was a part of the agreement, in other words.








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
